Revision of our Bylaws

- We have to revise our bylaws to bring them into line with the new Societies Act that will come into force in November 2016.
- We will need to pass a special resolution with a 75% majority at the AGM to accept the revised bylaws to bring them into line with the new Societies Act.
- We will need quorum and a supportive vote to achieve this.
- There are no significant changes; it will mainly require ensuring the wording meets the requirements of the new act.

Please plan to be at the event so we can make sure we have quorum. If you can't attend please submit a proxy – this will mean your vote can be included and will also count towards quorum. Proxy forms will be sent out with the formal notice of the AGM in September.

Study of Post-Stroke Social Networks by the Journal of Speech, Hearing, and Language Research



Journal of Speech, Language, and Hearing Research studied how social networks and support changed in the six months post-stroke. They looked at how different factors, such as aphasia, predicted the change in social networks. Overall, social networks shrunk and aphasia was the only stroke-related factor measured at the time of the stroke that predicted social network 6 months later.

University of Michigan Studies Cost of Caregiving



The University of Michigan has released a study that found that the value of caregivers of stroke survivors has been vastly underestimated by previous studies. The stroke survivor caregiver spends an average of 22.3 hours a week performing caregiving tasks, double the time of caring for elderly patients who have not suffered a stroke require. They estimate that the care is about t \$11,000 per stroke survivor per week, with annual estimate of around \$40 billion in costs to care for elderly stroke survivors. It is hoped that this study will bring awareness to the need for more mechanisms and support for both caregivers and stroke survivors.

CANWHEEL Study



Researchers from the University of British Columbia are currently seeking participants for a study that examines the nature and amount of added value that a caregiver provides to users of powered wheelchairs.

To be eligible to participate individuals must be:

- An unpaid caregiver and spend at least 2 hours per week with the powered wheelchair user OR Use his/her own powered wheelchair for at least 6 hours per week
- 18 years of age or older
- Live within 50km of Vancouver BC

Can read, write, and speak in English

A stipend will be provided to both the powered wheelchair user and the caregiver for their participation.

SCOOT STUDY



Researchers from UBC are seeking volunteers to participate in a study to examine the effectiveness of a new scooter training intervention.

This is the first study to investigate how scooter training affects the user's ability to move around in his/her community, engage in activities and participate in society. The study aims to evaluate the outcomes produced by one-on-one scooter training to older adults.

You are eligible if you:

- Are 60 years of age or older
- Have one month or less combined experience of scooter driving within the past year
- Are able to transfer in and out of your scooter independently
- · Can read, write and speak in English.



Vancouver Author Chronicles Stroke Recovery Journey




Vancouverite Ron Smith has recently published a book about his recovery from a massive ischemic stroke to the brain stem. Prior to his stroke, Ron was a writer, a publisher, and a teacher of Creative Writing at universities in Canada, the States, and Europe. Smith writes about the process of recuperation, exploring his own personal struggles and frustrations post-stroke. It also explores the different roles in healing - from caregiver, to doctor, to survivor - and addresses the limitations of the current the medical system.
