SRABC BOARD OF DIRECTORS UPDATE

Welcome, Catherine Sherrard, to Board of Directors

Catherine Sherrard has recently relocated to Vancouver Island and has brought with her an impressive resume of philanthropic and directorial experience. She spent over 30 years in the non-profit sector working as fundraiser and CEO while also participating as a community volunteer on a number of the boards. From chairing of Community Centre 55 in the Beaches area of Toronto in the 1980's to being the first female in the 75 year history of Toronto Hydro to be appointed Chair, Catherine has worked continually to make the community she lives in a better place. After working for Ontario March of Dimes in the 1990's she was asked to join their Board and continues the role by representing the Province of British Columbia.

SRABC/MODC Affiliation and Collaboration Agreement

- The affiliation and collaboration agreement between SRABC and MODC was signed April 1st.
- The SRABC office personnel are working on the implementation of the agreement.

- This mutually beneficial agreement allows SRABC to take advantage of MODC's management and administration resources, while advising them on stroke recovery and working with them on improving and enriching our programs and services.
- Bookkeepers Stelle and Crystal are working with MODC Finance on the transition to their systems for accounts payable and record keeping.
- Genevieve Thompson, SRABC Office Administrator, is now an employee of MODC and now reports to both Tim and Brent.
- Bookkeepers Stelle and Crystal are working with MODC Finance on the transition to their systems for accounts payable and record keeping.
- SRABC remains a separate organization and a Canadian Charity in its own right.
- The agreement lasts for 5 years after which it can be renegotiated.

Revision of our Bylaws

- We have to revise our bylaws to bring them into line with the new Societies Act that will come into force in November 2016.
- We will need to pass a special resolution with a 75% majority at the AGM to accept the revised bylaws to bring them into line with the new Societies Act.
- We will need quorum and a supportive vote to achieve this.
- There are no significant changes; it will mainly require ensuring the wording meets the requirements of the new act.

The Vancouver General Hospital is looking for participants for a research study about Ischemic Stroke and Hyperbaric Oxygen. If you're **between the ages of 19 and 85** and **have had one ischemic stroke 6 months to 3 years ago**, you could be eligible for this study. This study involves multiple visits over 2 years. You will be offered a small amount of money to assist with the travel costs of coming to Vancouver General Hospital for treatment and subsequent visits.

Update for charities from Member of Parliament Ted Falk

MP Ted Falk has drafted a Private Members Bill to help charities– *The Fairness in Charitable Gifts Act* (C-239). With this bill, donors to registered charities would receive the same generous federal tax credits that donors to political parties currently receive. In early June, *The Fairness in Charitable Gifts Act* will have its second hour of debate and must pass a crucial vote in order to move on. If it doesn't pass this vote, the Bill will be considered dead.

Falk is reaching out to ask that people consider sending an email to the Minister of Finance,

the leaders of the five federal political parties in Ottawa as well as re-contacting their own Member of Parliament.
